Revelation – The Big Picture

Week seven – The Gospel: sweet and sour Revelation 10 – 11

1. Scene One – A mighty Angel and a little scroll 10: 1 - 11

- An angel looking like Jesus from chapter 1
- A message, for all but not to be written down!
- The angel's right hand is raised No more delay!
 - i. Daniel 10:5, 12:6 A vision that the angel brings about
 - ii. 6 Trumpets and an opportunity to repent but the final trumpet is about to be sounded
- The scroll is taken and eaten sweet and sour. Ezekiel 2,3
- Gospel ministry is sweet and sour!

2. Scene Two – A measure and Two witnesses 11: 1 - 14

- Measure the temple of God God's living presence
- Prophesy and a witness for 42 months (1260 days)
- Two witnesses
 - Zerubbabel and Joshua Zechariah 3 4
 - Moses and Elijah Drought and water to blood
 - The reliability of two witnesses John 8:17 18
- The witnesses will be martyred
 - The world will rejoice for 3 ½ days The witness of the church will appear as defeated
 - But there will be a resurrection witness that stuns the world.
- A severe earthquake 7000 dead survivors terrified give glory to God

3. Scene 3 - The final trumpet 11: 15 - 19

- Christ the Saviour is finally recognised
- The elders worship The One who was and is but no longer 'is to come'!
- Judgements and rewards from the One who is holy
- The ark of the covenant God is faithful (Thessalonians 5:24)

Re-read Revelation 11: 1 – 14

- 6. What is the mission of the two witnesses and what authority are they given?
- 7. What happens to the two witnesses and what does Jesus want us to understand from this part of John's vision?

Re-read Revelation 11:15 – 19

- 8. How do the people of God take part in the victory of God?
- 9. What significance do you find in God's temple being opened and the ark of his covenant being seen?
 - A. What troubles you at the moment? How does Revelation 10 11 encourage and help you?
 - B. In what ways does this section of Revelation stimulate your prayer life as an individual as a small group and as a church family?
